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TREE DEDICATION AND GARDEN PARTY

As part of our Garden Ontario Week event, the Omemee Blooms Garden Club held a Tree Dedication at the green space on Mary Street behind the Omemee Post Office on June 18th at 1pm. It was followed by a Garden Party at the renovated Tri-School Garden on Rutland Street. Omemee Blooms was given money from OHA District 4 to plant a tree. It was decided to dedicate the tree to Gerald McGregor, a former Councillor, for his support and tireless work in securing funding from the City of Kawartha Lakes for the beautification of the village.



An Exclamation London Planetree was researched and chosen by Aron Muscutt our club horticulturist. This tree was chosen for its superior adaptability, hardiness, disease resistance and unique upright dense habit. This tree works very well in an urban site for its tolerance of poor soil, and drought. The mature size of this tree is 60 feet high by 45 feet wide. As a young tree it can grow three feet per year. Gerald was instrumental in procuring approval of a planting site. This tree will be a showpiece for years to come.

The Exclamation London Planetree has medium green foliage with deeply palmate lobed foliage that cloaks the tree all summer but the outstanding feature of this tree is the attractive exfoliating bark even at an early age. The mottled brown, green, and tan bark peels off in large plates revealing patches of interior bark in varying shades of cream to white.

Aron and Ron Muscutt planted the tree on May 25th with the generous assistance of Darren James Construction, his machinery and several workers. Due to the extreme drought it was necessary to water the tree every day after planting.



Thank you to Barbara McGregor and Ken Hunter for keeping the tree watered.

Following the dedication and ribbon cutting ceremony, guests socialized at a wonderful garden party, with refreshments and a delicious cake, decorated with a London Planetree. The Vice President of the Ontario Horticultural Society, Rose Odell, and Assistant Director of District 4, Pam Chellew honoured us with their presence. Greetings with regrets were received from Councillor Mary Ann Martin.



JUNIOR BUTTERFLY GARDEN

Ten children from four to eleven years of age, turned out to plant our Butterfly Garden Container outside Foodland Grocery Store.

We talked about annuals, perennials, mulch, soil, water and dead heading. It was noted that the plants might have a hard time this year due to the hot weather and lack of rain.

A SUMMER REPORT FROM OUR GREEN TEAM!!

This has been one of our more challenging summers, trying to keep the gardens green. We have been very fortunate to have Ken and Darlene Hunter who have been very dedicated volunteers. They have been continually watering the planters, gardens, and our new Exclamation London Planetree.

We have a small but very dedicated group of volunteers who have devoted their time to beautifying the village. We did not engage in making any new gardens this year but instead we have concentrated on maintaining the village gardens that we have previously created. The gardens have had the shrubs and trees trimmed with the help of the very experienced and efficient Aron Muscutt.

The gardens have been mulched with natural cedar mulch so we can suppress the weed growth and to retain moisture. It has been several years since we mulched and we are hoping this will reduce our workload as well as improve the health and aesthetics of the gardens. If you have not mulched your own gardens, you should consider doing so to reduce your water needs as well as inhibiting weed growth. Be sure to use natural cedar mulch rather than the dyed mulch which contains many elements you don't want in your gardens as it is made from all sorts of scrap wood and then dyed. You never know what harmful things you are putting into your soil by using this dyed mulch.

I hope that everyone has noticed our Exclamation London Planetree planted in the green space behind the post office. Aron Muscutt researched, purchased, transported, planted and staked this tree. We are so fortunate to have our own very knowledgeable horticulturist in our club. Darren James Contracting, very generously supplied two men and the machinery to plant the tree. We are fortunate to have local contractors who are willing to work with Omemee Blooms to beautify the village.

OHA District 4 supplied the funding to each society in District 4 to plant a tree. Gerald McGregor, a former councillor was instrumental in obtaining City permission to plant our tree in the green space behind the post office. Gerald has been very supportive and worked very hard during his term in office to obtain funding for Omemee Blooms to beautify the village. For this reason the tree was dedicated to Gerald at a dedication ceremony during Garden Ontario Week. You can read about the dedication in this issue of the newsletter.
