Changes in Our September Award Presentations:

Once again, times are changing and these changes dictate revisions to some of our past practices. The most recent changes affect our <u>trophy presentations</u>. The cost of engraving has risen and storage of the trophies was problematic, as was getting trophies returned on time. A survey of our members showed that receiving the trophy/hardware wasn't as important as achieving the win. An Awards Committee was formulated to review our award system.

The final result was as follows: Effective 2016: 1) the physical garden trophies have been retired and each category (same as in the past) will now receive a prize of \$5 which is approximately the past engraving cost. We hope that the winners will find this more practical while the honour of winning most points in a category will remain the same. Over the next year we will continue to examine the trophy <u>categories</u> and using the questionnaire that Christa handed out, the Show Committee will evaluate the current categories.
