trillium

Trillium erectum, wake-robin (red trillium) and Trillium grandiflorum, white trillium

Trillium erectum or red trillium, wake robin, Beth root or stinking Benjamin. Named wake-robin after red breast of robin that heralds spring.

Plant is native to eastern Canada and eastern United States.

Grow to 18' in height with a 12" spread. Plant can tolerate extreme cold to -35C Grows from a thick rhizome with fleshy roots. Grows best in dappled shade in humus rich soil. Apparently I have never got right down and smelled the flowers but they are supposed to have a smell like rotting meat so that they attract flies that are their pollinators. Trillium erectum can also come in white or pale pink

Trillium erectum flowers first and then the Trillium grandiflorum or white

Trillium grandiflorum or white trillium is larger than the Trillium erectum or wake-robin. Trillium grandiflorum takes 7-10 years in the wild to reach flowering size. There is some concern that most plants sold commercially are collected from the wild. Collecting, habitat destruction and grazing [especially white tailed deer] is endangering the plant in some areas. Trillium grandiflorum turns pink as the flowers age.

Bumblebees are the pollinators and ants are responsible for transporting the seed.

So now you know, Trillium erectum, red trillium, wake-robin is a smaller foul smelling red trillium that blooms first in the spring, followed by Trillium grandiflorum which is a larger white trillium.
